Summary evaluation with respect to the request for accreditation of the Master Programme Public Administration and Master Programme Public Policy, The American University in Cairo, School of Global Affairs and Public Affairs, Department of Public Policy and Administration – Egypt.

In consideration of the Self-Evaluation Report of the above programmes, the Site Visit Report of 18 December 2023 of the EAPAA Site Visit Team for these programmes, and the response of the programme to the draft of the Site Visit Report, the EAPAA Accreditation Committee, at its meeting of 4 September 2024 in Athens, Greece, has evaluated these programmes against the EAPAA Standards (version 2, September 2022).

Entry into the	Selection is based on a combination of objective measures and

Structure of the	The curriculum for both programmes includes compulsory, elective
curriculum	and concentration courses. Each course has internal value of 3 credits,
	equal (according to the explanation by the programmes) to 12 ECTS.
	This would mean that the teaching workload is as minimum 396 ECTS.

Content of the	Taking into the account the small number of courses the curricula
